## HYDRANGEAS, part 1

Dormant Pruning: Hydrangeas that should be pruned during winter.

### TITLE: HYDRANGEAS (part 1); dormant pruning

**Description:** Some Hydrangeas need to be pruned during the winter in order to bloom. Some hydrangeas should NOT be pruned during the winter. Others are rarely pruned.

**Objective(s):** Learn the different types of Hydrangeas so that you will prune at the right time of year. This video focuses on the Hydrangeas that should be pruned during winter.

**WHAT:** The most popular, and most common, Hydrangeas in the U.S. fall into four categories: *H. macrophylla, H. arborescens, H. paniculata, and H. quercifolia*.

\*\*\*\*\* The H. arborescens and H. paniculata are pruned while dormant. \*\*\*\*\*

Common varieties include:

<u>H. arborescens</u> 'Annabelle' 'Grandiflora' H. paniculata'Brussels Lace''Chantilly Lace''Pee Gee''Pee Wee''Pink Diamond''White Moth''Limelight''Limelight'

**WHY:** The *H. arborescens* and *H. paniculata* bloom on "new wood", so pruning in winter will promote new growth when the plant comes out of dormancy. Blooms will develop on that new growth.

**WHEN:** Dormant pruning in east TN usually begins in January and can continue into February, and maybe into early March. Do not press your luck; prune in January or February – before buds form.

**WHERE:** *H. arborescens* prefers partial shade, but will perform well in full sun if given adequate moisture. *H. paniculata* prefers full sun to light shade.

**HOW:** *H. arborescens* is among the easiest to prune. Simply cut it back hard in early spring -- cut back all stems to about 12 inches from the soil line.

*H. paniculata* These can really get big (easily 10-15', and upwards of 25') but tolerate pruning enough to be turned into tree form. If size is of no concern, simply remove spent flowers and any broken stems.

#### SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT POINTS:

- If unsure of the type of Hydrangea that you have, do NOT prune until you determine the type (except to remove the 4 D's: dead, diseased, damaged, dysfunctional)
- The 4 D's can be removed any time of year
- Winter / Dormant Prune these types of Hydrangea:
  - *H. arborescens* is easy to prune; just cut all stems back to about 12". You are pruning for blooms.
  - *H. paniculata* is a large Hydrangea. Be sure it is planted in a place where it can get its normal size and prune it more like a tree. You are pruning to keep this plant attractive. Trying to prune to keep it small will have you in a perpetual battle.
- Pruning is done with hand pruners, and maybe loppers. Never use shears on a hydrangea of any type.
- Hydrangeas that are pruned AFTER flowering: (discussed in a later video)
  - *H. macrophylla*
  - H. quercifolia
  - 4 D's can be removed at any time
